# PCHS Railroad News Spencer Stone

Railroads historically provide goods and services directly to the towns throughout Pine County and many community members were directly employed by the railroads. Times have changed on the big Railroads but many activities are continually in progress at the PCHS RR. Rolly Johnson is not only our longest active member but he brings many experiences having been station master for the Northern Pacific [NP] in towns from Cloquet to Hinckley and more. Rolly recognized the need for RR stations on the PCHS RR. With thin plywood and computer generated windows, doors, siding and more he built scale model stations for all the towns as well as many other buildings. Rich Wahlquist, has taken an active role in Maintenance of Way [MOW]. Rich continually searches through the many boxes of donated

HO scale stuff for track-side embellishments. Signs, people, telegraph poles, vehicles, trees; all get planted, improving realism on the PCHS RR. Dave Pemberton has helped enhance our scale version of railroads in Pine county. Dave was key to installation of a power system allowing for improved control of trains around the entire layout. Dave also has located several authentic scale models of RR equipment that used to operate through our county, bringing further realism to the PCHS RR. Like the railroad-workers of the past these volunteers are crucial to the continued success of the PCHS RR. Also crucial are photos and copies of photos showing communities along the railroads, during and earlier than the 1960's. They will be greatly appreciated by PCHS RR. Volunteers are also needed to help reconstruct buildings and other structures that were part of those towns.





Basket by Zac Fittipaldi

Basket weaving is a craft with a rich cultural history. Woven baskets have been around for tens of thousands of years, with traces found in the Egyptian Pyramids, as well as in many other archaeological sites around the world. It is one of the oldest crafts in Native American history. Baskets have traditionally been made using materials found in the environment; grasses, bark, roots, and other plant materials. They have been used to gather food and to cradle babies, and they have been worn on the head to shade the face from the sun.

# Make Your Own Butt Basket in a Day

Instructor, Zac Fittipaldi, has been weaving baskets since 2006, using a variety of materials and basket styles. In this full-day class, he will teach you how to make this ribbed basket, also known as a "butt basket" from Western Europe. It is a simple under-over weave and is made entirely of willow. At the end of the workshop, you will take home a completed basket, as well as the knowledge to continue your basket weaving journey.





The Butt or Buttocks Basket, so named due to the double-lobed shape, is commonly used for collecting eggs, fruits and vegetables. The design provides easy carrying and efficient storage. Antique Butt Baskets originated from Western Europe and date back to the 1800's and possibly earlier.

# Skally Line Concert at PCHS Elinor Auge

On Saturday, April 6th, an audience of about eighty people, was treated to a special musical event by Fred Keller and Bill Cagley. The free concert, held in the Small Event Center at the Pine County History Museum, was Keller's fulfillment of a grant that he had received through the East Central Regional Arts Council (ECRAC). All of the songs that the duo, known as The Skally Line, performed during the highly entertaining hour, were written by Keller and, except for one, were based on artifacts and stories that he had discovered and researched at the Museum. It was a pleasant hour of old-time string music with songs and tales about logging, bootlegging, farming and other historical Pine County activities. The Saga of the Side Rake Kathy Bade

Recently I had the pleasure of watching Fred Keller and his friend, Bill Cagley perform songs he had created based on stories he had obtained from the Pine County History Museum. As the lead for the Accessions Team, I was able to recognize all these stories, and enjoyed the songs immensely. They brought to mind this story that I recently entered into the museum's database, which I call "The Saga of the Side Rake", and is as recalled by Ed Stoffel. Henry and Rose Stoffel began their married life in 1922 as tenant dairy and crop farmers. Farm prices were fairly good at this time along with potato cash crop. They were able to save up enough money to start buying their own machinery, which consisted of a hay mower, loader and side delivery windrow rake. In the mid 1930's they had share-crop rented a farm on the west side of Pokegama Lake. This outstanding farm was owned by P. W. McAllen, a banker in Pine City. The farm included a horse racing track as well as a golf course. One day Henry needed to spend a few hours in Pine City. While he was gone, Mr. McAllen and his partner in banking, Mr. Hodge, decided to rake up pine cones off the golf course using Henry's new side delivery rake. Being bankers and not farmers, they misused the rake and nearly ruined it. Henry was quite furious when he returned and saw what they were doing. The two bankers had to pay a substantial repair bill. In the mid 1940's, Henry was using this same rake with a young team of horses he had raised from colts. Something frightened one of the horses and they began to run away. Henry managed to get off the machine, but the horses continued on until they came to a fence line and then turned parallel to the fence, taking out 13 fence posts and wrapping the wire around the drum of the wheel until it could not turn. Evidence of the bent wheel is still visible to this day, and can be seen here at the Pine County History Museum. Ed Stoffel donated a lot of his farm machinery, which he had in a museum on his property just west of Pine City, back in 2022. Most of it is on display outdoors at the museum, on the former tennis court area that is leased from the City of Askov. Take a stroll through that area when you visit the museum. Maybe it will bring back memories of the days you, or your parents/grandparents used those machines to make their living. I remember well bouncing across the hay field on our little Ford 8N tractor, pulling the side rake to make nice, even windrows for the hay loader to pick up and drop into the hay rack. I raked hay as an adult, too, but fortunately we had a baler by then!
